TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the 1 January 2021 to 31 December 2021

Objectives and Activities

a. Policies and objectives

The St Chad's Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. Reverend Mother Yejide Peters resigned from her post to return to her native New York in August 2021 and, during the interregnum, the Church is being led by the two Church Wardens with support from retired and local clergy.

The church is an open and welcoming church providing an opportunity for learning, reflection and prayer.

As a town centre church, St Chad's also ministers to visitors to the town and to those who attend church regularly but live outside the parish. It also acts as the civic church to the town of Shrewsbury and the military church for the county of Shropshire.

b. Activities for achieving objectives

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at St Chad's and to become part of the St Chad's and wider church community. The services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament.

Regular church services had to be modified during the global Covid pandemic to reflect national lockdown and government and Church of England policy. In usual times the church holds three services each Sunday and a varying number of midweek services and in person and Zoom prayer meetings.

St Chad's also hosts regular civic services, when asked to do so: Mayor Making, Battle of Britain, and Remembrance; all of which welcome the wider community into the church and enable them to participate in worship within the context of their lives. If asked by the Chairman of the Shropshire Council, St Chad's also hosts the annual Shropshire Civic Service.

St Chad's welcomes other groups from both within and beyond the parish both for worship and for visits to the church.

When planning activities for the year, the incumbent and the PCC have considered the Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion.

In particular, we try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community through:

- worship and prayer
- learning about the Gospel
- developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus
- developing Christian fellowship through small group meetings and pilgrimages
- providing vocational training
- provision of pastoral care
- outreach work with visitors, schools and the elderly

To facilitate this work it is important that the fabric of the Church of St. Chad and our church hall are maintained.

c. Public benefit

The Trustees are aware of the Charity Commission's revised guidance on public benefit in the publication entitled "The Advancement of Religion for the Public Benefit" and have had regard to it in their administration of the charity.

They believe that supporting and promoting the work of St Chad's will help to promote the pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical mission of the Church of England more effectively, within the community of Shrewsbury and in doing so benefiting the public by:

- providing facilities for public worship, pastoral care spiritual nurture and moral and intellectual development, both for its members and for anyone else who wishes to benefit from what St Chad's offers;
- promoting Christian values, and service by members of St Chad's in and to their communities, to the benefit of individuals and society as a whole;
- providing financial and practical support to local national and international charities and similar organisations;
- providing education and volunteering opportunities for young people, and
- opening the church to the wider public by providing a concert auditorium for choral, orchestral and organ recitals and, on a smaller scale, a space for local schools to hold their Christmas services during the annual Christmas Tree festival.

Achievements and performance

a. Review of activities

Worship and Prayer

Covid resulted in the cancellation of the Battle of Britain Service and Battle of Bligny service. There was a church service on Remembrance Day which was followed by an outdoor Remembrance service in the in the Quarry attended by the presiding vicar and members of the congregation. The Christmas services were, once again, disrupted by Covid so a well attended 9 Lessons and Carols service was held in the church car park with Bishop Sarah in attendance. The crib service was live-streamed to reduced numbers and the Christmas Day services took place in church as planned.

Baptisms, Weddings and funeral services were held in the church throughout the year. During 2021 there were 2 (2020: 1) baptisms, 5 (2020: 0) weddings and 3 (2020: 7) funerals at St Chad's. The numbers were greatly influenced by the effect of the pandemic. The church wardens believe it is very important for the church to engage with and support families, couples and the bereaved and their families in the weeks and months surrounding such services. St Chad's had an All Souls' Service to which the families of many people who had died during lockdown were invited. This was very well received because so many families had not been able to hold the funeral services that they would have wanted for their loved ones.

The electoral roll stands at 133 (2020 131).

Worship and Prayer - continued

St Chad's continues to benefit from a rich musical tradition including the wonderful singing of the St Chad's choir, under the guidance of its Director of Music, Tony Pinel. Church services were much enhanced by the reintroduction of music and singing in 2021. Our Assistant Director of Music, Richard Walker, is responsible for the regular Friday concerts which are an important aspect of outreach and we were delighted to be able to resume these services in 2021.

Pastoral Care

A team of pastoral care volunteers work, under the supervision of the vicar and church wardens, to support to those in need and those who have requested it, with visits (including the taking of home communion) being made to the elderly and infirm at their homes or at care homes. Prayers are said for those who have asked for them, and for those who are sick, bereaved and for those who have died. Prayers are included in the intercessions and a prayer list is included in the weekly pew sheets.

The regular Friday concerts attract a number of residents of care homes with their carers; and the lunches provided in the church hall after the concerts provide a very happy opportunity for socialising with the wider community and are a boon for many elderly people living either by themselves or with partners and other family members who have become more isolated or are requiring an increasing level of support.

Mission and Outreach

The church is normally open seven days per week between 8am and 4.30pm. Opening times were, on occasion, curtailed by Coronavirus restrictions but the church remains an open and welcoming place even when the building is closed, with Zoom and streamed services, coffee mornings and discussion groups.

St Chad's places great importance on being a welcoming and inclusive church. Many visitors are welcomed to the church by volunteer church stewards who will talk about both the history of the beautiful building and also about church activities and interests. Visitors are often invited to attend concerts, church events and services.

Harvest Festival offerings were distributed to the Ark and to the local Food Bank.

St Chad's held a limited Christmas Tree festival in 2021. Covid restrictions reduced the level of school involvement but there was participated from a number of voluntary groups and it was a pleasure to welcome the various clubs and organisations as they held their carol and nativity services in the church. The St Chad's Christmas Fair was also a well-attended and happy event.

Church services and other events and activities are publicised on the website and the Parish Administrator in the church office responds to enquiries on a daily basis.

Use of the Church Hall was restricted by Covid but, in early 2022, it has been put to good use with the introduction of providing breakfasts for the homeless. This initiative has had a strong response from volunteers from both within the church and the wider community. Another early 2022 development has been using the Church and hall to hold fund raising events for people impacted by the war in Ukraine.

Church Building

In common with many other churches, St Chad's occupies a fine historic building that is very expensive to maintain. The church is grateful for ongoing financial support from the congregation and the Friends of St Chad's to maintain the fabric of the church building.

The church had no repeat of the significant expenditure on repairing the heating system following the winter of 2018/19, but it is planning to update its heating system and the Church has been very grateful to receive an offer from the Friends of St Chad's for funding the potential cost of doing so.

Costs are regularly incurred arising out of 'wear and tear maintenance' of both the church and church hall.

Volunteers

St Chad's depends upon many volunteers to assist in the day to day running of the church. These volunteers act as servers, members of the choir; members of the fabric committee; members of the pastoral care team and as the sides persons who are on duty at the three Sunday services. We are also reliant on our volunteer bookkeeper and Treasurer.

b. Investment policy and performance

St Chad's tangible freehold investment property comprises the residence known as 1 St Chad's Terrace Shrewsbury and the St Chad's Parish Hall together have an aggregate value of £572,000 (2020: £585,000). The two freehold properties were professionally revalued on 1 April 2016 in accordance with the policy of the PCC to undertake revaluations every five years. The properties were to have been revalued in 2021 but, with Covid restrictions limiting access to the building, the revaluation has been deferred until 2022.

St Chad's received a gross rent of £21,000 (2020: £20,129) from the assured short hold tenancies of 1 St Chad's Terrace and the old St Chad's Cottage (which is owned by the Diocese of Lichfield, but rented out by St Chad's).

In addition St Chad's maintains a cash reserve deposit with CCLA Investment Management Limited which amounted to £10,000 at 31 December 2021 (2020: £10,000). Gross interest of between 0.7% and 0.9% is paid on this deposit. This reserve was transferred to Lloyds Bank in early 2022.

Financial review

a. Going concern

The post-Covid levels of reserves are of concern and the PCC has launched a financial review to improve the Church's financial position. St Chad's has had an excellent response to its 2022 Lent Campaign, and it has worked hard with its car park and cleaning staff to reduce staffing levels and associated costs with more use being made of modern technology. St Chad's is very grateful to the support received from these staff during this process. St Chad's is also working closely with Lichfield Diocese on reducing Parish Share arrears.

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees believe that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

b. Reserves policy

In 2013 the PCC borrowed £100,000 from the Diocese to fund the substantial works needed on the tower of the church. At 31 December 2021 the outstanding loan balance was £10,579 (2020: £15,530). The loan is being repaid over 10 years with the final repayment due to be made in February 2024.

Regular committed giving fell in 2021 but this was partially offset by increased collections and donations following the post Covid re-opening of the church. There was no legacy income in 2021 (2020: £27,000)

b. Reserves policy - continued

The PCC needs to consider ways to fund the growth, development and mission of St Chad's. The PCC is undertaking a financial review to increase its current liquid reserves so that they are sufficient to cover three months' expenses.

Unrestricted liquid reserves at 31 December 2021 were £6,660 (2020: £31,612). This is after accruing for £32,678 of Parish Share Arrears which the PCC has started to pay off in 2022 by maintaining the former level of Parish Share payments to the Diocese rather than the new, lower, Common Fund Payments. The PCC is very grateful to have received an offer from the Diocese to match every £1 that the PCC pays off its Parish Share arrears which will, at the current repayment rate, enable St Chad's to clear its Parish Share arrears balance by March 2023. The repayment is being funded by cost savings and additional income generated by actions recommended by the wide sweeping and ongoing financial review.

This level of reserves at 31 December 2021 would cover just less than two weeks' expenses, rather than the targeted three months' expense figure of £49,018 but the church enjoys the continued support of its PCC and the Lichfield Diocese.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The PCC which is a registered charity number 1132443 is a corporate body established by the Church of England with perpetual succession and has a legal existence apart from the members who compose it. The PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure (1956) as amended, and the Church Representation Rules 2006.

The members of the PCC are the trustees of the charity.

The Churchwardens are responsible with the PCC for the allocation of expenditure out of the income of the church. The Vicar and Churchwardens have no power to sell the freehold estate in the church. The PCC is not the body with economic or financial benefit from the sale of St Chad's church or vicarage. For this reason neither property is included in the attached financial statements as a tangible fixed asset of St Chad's. Possession of the church (but not the vicarage) is vested in the Vicar and Churchwardens jointly.

Moveable furniture and ornaments are in the legal ownership of the Churchwardens for the benefit of the PCC. Care, maintenance and insurance of the fabric of the church, its goods and ornaments and other structures are the responsibility of the PCC. The freeholds and cash deposited with the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England are held, either as trustee of endowments or for assets of restricted funds or nominee of the PCC for unrestricted assets, by the Lichfield Diocesan Trust, St Mary's House, The Close, Lichfield, Staffordshire, WS13 7LD.

b. Method of appointment or election of Trustees

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

The PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent.

The full PCC met 6 times during the year. Given its wide responsibilities, the PCC has a number of committees, all of which are responsible to the PCC and report back regularly with minutes of their deliberations being received by the full PCC and discussed as necessary.

c. Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

The Trustees provide training and advice to newly appointed Trustees. All Trustees have access to the information and support provided by the Diocese of Lichfield and individual Trustees periodically attend meetings to meet trustees of similar sized churches to discuss challenges and experience and share best practice.

d. Organisational structure and decision making

Within the Diocese of Lichfield of the Church of England and the Shrewsbury Deanery, the parish is organised in the conventional way with responsibility currently vested the Churchwardens and the PCC.

e. Risk management

The PCC has examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charity faces and confirms that systems have been established to manage the charity's exposure to the major risks identified.

Plans for future periods

a. Future developments

The church is focused on clarifying its mission objectives, strengthening administrative and organisational structures, and developing long term stewardship (fundraising) goals, objectives, and strategies. This will likely be a several years process, laying groundwork for future endeavours, not least of which is long term financial stability and missional success.

We have begun to redevelop education programming for adults and children, and hope to expand on existing opportunities as well as creating new programmes and resources for people of all ages to grow in their Christian faith and commitment.

The church continues to work with organisations as diverse as Shrewsbury University Centre, Severn Hospice, and Shrewsbury High School and has strengthened its working arrangements with The Ark, an outreach ministry to the undomiciled and housing-fragile residents of our town, the Street Pastors and other local churches in the development of the Sunrise group which prepared breakfasts for the homeless in 2022. Further development of this group is under discussion.

b. Covid 19

Since the March 2020 the Coronavirus pandemic has resulted in lockdowns across the world. During the UK lockdown, St Chad's closed its building and furloughed its car parking and cleaning staff but kept in touch with the congregation and wider community by post, email, telephone calls and streamed video services, coffee mornings and discussion groups. Members of the congregation were given contact numbers for the clergy and, if they had consented to be included within the church directory, contact numbers for their friends within the church. Protocols were put in place to ensure the safety of all church members, staff and visitors.

During 2021 the Church missed its many outreach events such as the Friday concerts and there has been a knock on impact to the church finances from having fewer services, concerts and visitors.

St Chad's is considering how services will be delivered in future and what its outreach and mission will look like in a post Coronavirus environment. There have been a number of developments with the establishment of the Daylight mission group within the Church and the Sunrise group which is working with external agencies and volunteers from other churches and those without a church.

Safeguarding

The PCC believe that they have fulfilled their duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults).

Related Parties

Donations from related parties (PCC members and other Trustees) amounted to £10,303 (2020: £15,071).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

1. **ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirement of paragraph 3.17(d);
- the requirements of paragraphs 11.42, 11.44, 11.45, 11.47, 11.48(a)(iii), 11.48(a)(iv), 11.48(b)
- the requirements of paragraphs 12.26, 12.27, 12.29(a), 12.29(b) and 12.29A;
- the requirement of paragraph 33.7.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Property:

2% per annum of revalued amount on a straight line basis.

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted

ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

The endowed fund relates specifically to the value of the Parish Hall and the only transactions that are treated as movements in the endowed funds are changes to its value such as annual depreciation and movements on revaluation.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pensions

The charity contributes to NEST pensions for those employees enrolled in the NEST pension scheme.

Going concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Debtors

Trade or other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Liabilities and Provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of these amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.
